# 8:45 a.m. – IDEA '04—New and Improved? (keynote)

Beginning in the late 1980s, a number of court cases throughout the country greatly enhanced the potential for students with disabilities to be educated in inclusive settings. In 1997, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) was amended in ways which furthered the likelihood of the success of inclusion programs. Have the 2004 amendments, the Individuals with Disabilities *Improvement* Act, helped or hindered these prospects? *Ron Hager's* address will highlight these developments, with the goal of providing a greater understanding of the major themes and purposes of the IDEA, as well as a number of specific ways in which these themes are implemented to make inclusion work.

# 10:15 a.m.-3:15 p.m. (12:15-1:15 lunch) P.I.E.: Social Emotional Teaching Strategies

This session focuses on elements essential to any classroom—regardless of age or ability level of the child. The first element concerns classroom management. *Mary Knapp and Verna Thompson* will show how important routines, rules, and understanding "teachable moments" are for the success of all involved in the class. The second element concerns the foundation of successful social relationships between children and the people that they meet throughout their life. The presenters will demonstrate techniques for developing friendship skills, anger management, problem solving, and building "feeling" vocabularies.

### **Collaborative Teaming in the Middle**

Teaming in middle school is essential in creating inclusive learning communities in which all students and teachers succeed. In this interactive session with *Ann Monroe-Baillargeon*, participants will examine the professional art of co-

teaching from creation to implementation and discuss potential pitfalls along the way. Teaming across teachers and teaching assistants, with parents, and among students will be explored. Come prepared to examine beliefs, design practices, and move forward in collaboration.

## Special Education in the 21st Century

Where are we 31 years after the passage of what is now called the Individuals with Disabilities Education Improvement Act? How has the IDEA changed over time and what has remained the same? *Ron Hager* will take a detailed look at federal and state statutes, regulations, and case law to answer these questions. We will look at developments in a wide range of areas, such as inclusion, the IEP process, transition, assistive technology (AT), assessment and achievement, and due process. The goal is to enhance our understanding of the major themes and purposes of the IDEA, as well as to see how these themes are carried out in specific detail.

### Universal Design for Learning (UDL): Making the Curriculum Accessible for All Students

UDL incorporates multiple means of representation, expression, and engagement in order to effectively reach the widest number of students. This session is designed to help educators understand the benefits and principles of UDL. Universally designed goals, methods, materials, and assessments accommodate the widest possible number of individuals from the outset. Learn how to spend less time "retrofitting" instruction and assessment, giving you more time to spark learner creativity and achievement. This session will help attendees eliminate curricular barriers in their own educational practice by acquainting them with UDL principles. Tools and strategies that make curricular access for all students a reality will also be covered. Presented by the staff of the Delaware **Assistive Technology Initiative.**
